College Planning Timeline: JUNIORS

Fall	
	Check your class schedule. Are you on track to graduate?
	If you haven't already, get serious about school! Colleges will consider your cumulative
	GPA, but they will also look for improvement.
	Make community service or other outside-of-school activities part of your education.
	Join a school-sponsored club.
	Now is a great time to challenge yourself. Try for a leadership position or a part in the
	fall play. Try out for a sport team, seek out volunteer positions that relate to your career
	plans.
	Prepare for the PSAT – This is a practice test for SAT and a high score can qualify
	students for National Merit Scholarship consideration. You will be automatically
	registered for the test, and it is paid for by the school.
	Visit colleges over school breaks.
	Attend College Fairs. There is the Out-of-State Fair and the Christian College Fair every
	October in Colorado Springs.
	Visit with college representatives that come to Vanguard. Check Naviance and the
	bulletin board in the main hall for scheduled visits.
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	Meet with college friends returning for winter break, and ask for their suggestions on
	preparing for the first semester of college.
	Talk as a family about paying for college. Ask parents about geographic or
	financial concerns that may affect your college search. Attend our Financial Aid
	evening session in January.
	Complete all assigned eleventh grade ICAP tasks.
	Start a list of colleges you may be interested in based on majors, location, size, and
	tuition.
	Register for the College Opportunity Fund (COF).
	Look for PSAT results to arrive in December.
	Take at least one practice exam before taking the SAT Reasoning Test or the ACT.

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Spring

	Schedule your junior conference with the college counselor. Parents are invited. Prior to your conference you must complete the Junior Conference Worksheet (under "About Me" tab on Naviance).
	Complete all assigned eleventh grade ICAP tasks.
	Visit colleges. Spring break is a great opportunity to visit colleges on your list.
	Research schools and take note of application/financial aid requirements and deadlines.
	Learn the entrance requirements for the schools on your list.
	Start researching scholarships. Some deadlines are in early fall of your senior year.
	Register for the ACT and/or SAT tests. Note: All juniors will be given the State ACT
	during school hours in April. Determine if any of the colleges you are interested in
	requires the SAT subject tests or the writing portion of the ACT (not included in the State
	ACT).
	Playing sports in college? Check NCAA eligibility requirements. Order transcripts to be
	sent to NCAA at the end of your junior year for initial eligibility clearance.
	Register for appropriate senior classes. Colleges want to see the most demanding
	schedule that you can manage successfully.
	Review your senior year schedule with your counselor.
	Apply on time for summer jobs and academic enrichment opportunities, including
	volunteer work.
	Prepare early for the May AP exams.
Summer	
	Create a summer reading list with recommendations from teachers, counselors, and the
	local library.
	Research essays required by the colleges on your list and start to draft essays.
	Begin brainstorming ideas for your college and scholarship essays.
	If you are interested in attending a military academy, begin now. Go the service academy
	admission's web site and register your interest.
